Abstract

This paper formalizes a procedural philosophy summarized as: no claims, no denials, do the work; let the fruit reveal the function. It consolidates four related principles: claim restraint, refusal of identity-centered denial, task-centered conduct, and evaluation by observable consequences. The framework is designed for controversial, interdisciplinary, or identity-sensitive work in which disputes about the author can displace examination of the artifact. It does not prohibit hypotheses, conclusions, or correction. Rather, it requires that conclusions remain downstream of documented work and that titles remain downstream of demonstrated function. The paper defines the method, identifies its ethical boundaries, and proposes tests for author-independent evaluation.

3. Separate observations, hypotheses, interpretations, and conclusions.
4. Complete the work without adding identity claims.
5. Publish methods, versions, failures, and limitations.
6. Invite evaluation of the artifact rather than allegiance to the author.
7. Use outcomes to revise the claimed function.
8. Permit titles only as descriptive shorthand, never as proof.

Reviewers reach similar evaluations when author identity is hidden.

P2

The work remains usable after removal of biographical material.

Claims shrink or change when outputs fail.

P4

Criticism can be answered through the record rather than personal defense.

6. Failure Conditions and Falsification

The framework should be revised, narrowed, or rejected where its categories cannot be applied consistently, where it does not improve prediction or decision quality, where simpler existing methods perform equally well at lower cost, or where its use produces the harms it was designed to prevent.

7. Limitations

- Silence can be misused where explicit denial is ethically or legally necessary.
- Observable fruit may take time to appear.
- Good outcomes do not excuse harmful methods.
- Author context can sometimes be materially relevant to conflicts, expertise, or provenance.

8. Ethical Safeguards

- Do not convert a conceptual framework into a diagnosis, legal conclusion, or coercive authority.
- Preserve contrary evidence and failed applications.
- Separate description from moral judgment.
- Require stronger review as consequences become more irreversible.
- Permit affected persons to contest classification and use.
