

Historical Report: Colonel Eli Lilly (1838-1898) Founder of Eli Lilly and Company

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Executive Summary

This report provides a historical overview of Colonel Eli Lilly, founder of Eli Lilly and Company. Colonel Eli Lilly died on June 6, 1898. Leadership passed to his son, Josiah K. Lilly Sr., who expanded the company's manufacturing capacity and research focus.
