

# BLEMMYES/EWAIPANOMA HYPOTHETICAL MODEL

Master Scatter Pattern Analysis — All Accounts & Research

## 1. Overall Scatter Pattern Summary

Across classical sources, medieval literature, early modern independent accounts (Raleigh 1595 and Lourenszoon 1618–1625), and our research, a clear geographic and temporal pattern emerges. The strongest and longest continuous presence is in Northeastern Africa (Eastern Desert / Lower Nubia). Later independent descriptions appear in the Guianas (South America) in the late 16th–early 17th centuries. This distribution is most consistent with a real vulnerable population originating in warm, stable parts of Africa, with possible scattered remnants or the myth traveling with European exploration.

## 3. Interpretation of the Pattern

The distribution is most consistent with a real vulnerable population that originated in warm, stable parts of Northeastern Africa. The anatomy (face on chest, short neck stub) would have been poorly suited to cold climates, making long-term northern expansion unlikely. The two independent early modern accounts in the Guianas are geographically distant but temporally later. This could represent either very late scattered remnants pushed outward over centuries, or the myth traveling with European explorers and being re-applied to new Indigenous testimonies. The African environmental advantage (warm climate reducing thermoregulatory stress on a low brain position and exposed chest features) is the strongest explanatory factor for long-term persistence.
