Abstract

This paper consolidates four principles of disciplined judgment: questions over answers, document over declare, morality over legality, and formality before familiarity. Together they describe a sequence for inquiry and interaction. Begin with questions that expose assumptions; create records that permit review; test actions against moral duties rather than minimum legal permission; and establish respect before seeking familiarity, trust, or influence. The framework is not anti-answer, anti-law, or anti-informality. It places each downstream of a prior obligation: answers must earn closure, declarations must have records, legality must not exhaust morality, and familiarity must not precede consent and respect.

5. Listen before attempting persuasion or solution.
6. Form a provisional answer tied to the record.
7. Document dissent and unresolved questions.
8. Revise when new evidence or moral consequences emerge.

5. Testable Propositions

P1

Questions produce discriminating evidence rather than endless ambiguity.

P2

Independent reviewers can audit the record.

P3

Actions remain defensible when legal permission is removed as the only justification.

P4

Participants report that boundaries and respect were established before influence was attempted.

6. Failure Conditions and Falsification

The framework should be revised, narrowed, or rejected where its categories cannot be applied consistently, where it does not improve prediction or decision quality, where simpler existing methods perform equally well at lower cost, or where its use produces the harms it was designed to prevent.

7. Limitations

- Questions can be used to evade decisions.
- Documentation can become performative bureaucracy.
- Moral judgments can be paternalistic or contested.
- Excessive formality can block necessary warmth or urgency.

8. Ethical Safeguards

- Do not convert a conceptual framework into a diagnosis, legal conclusion, or coercive authority.
- Preserve contrary evidence and failed applications.
- Separate description from moral judgment.
- Require stronger review as consequences become more irreversible.
- Permit affected persons to contest classification and use.
