

3 Inmate Deaths Caused By Drinking Anti-Freeze

PUTNAMVILLE, Ind. (UPI)—Three inmates of the Indiana State Farm died Monday after drinking a poisonous concoction made of anti-freeze.

The victims were Carlos White, 28, of Hammond; Wilbur Bowen, 19, of Jeffersonville, and Jesse Tudder, 41, of Lafayette.

White, who was sentenced for drunken driving, and Bowen, who was serving a term for larceny, died in Robert Long Hospital here late Monday. Tudder, also serving a drunken driving sentence, died earlier in the day.

Supt. Walter Hock said at least 12 other prisoners were sickened by the drink. They included, Hock said, Raymond Morton, 22, of Indianapolis, and Paul Durcho, 39, Hammond, who were reported in critical condition at Robert Long Hospital.

Hock said the men indicated they did not know what they were drinking.

He immediately ordered a thorough search of the institution to determine if other contraband intoxicants were cached away. He also ordered placed under lock and key all barrels containing anti-freeze from which the deadly drink apparently was drained.

Hock said he had no idea how the men got the anti-freeze but assumed it was "given or sold to them or something."

Officers guarding the prisoners Sunday night discovered some of

them obviously intoxicated. On further examination, the men were found to be sick, some of them quite ill. They were taken to the institution hospital for treatment.

Apparently the full story of what had caused the illness and the death of Jesse Tudder, 41, Lafayette, was not determined for many hours after the men were found. Hock said he did not learn of what happened until late Monday morning.

DETROIT (AP)—Chrysler Corp. production of 1959 models has ended and General Motors divisions begin shutting down this week.

By the end of next week only Ford Motor Co. divisions plus Chevrolet still will be assembling 1959 models.

Last week the industry built 122,672 cars, off only a fraction from the previous week's 123,446. A year ago in the comparable week 62,846 cars were built. So far this year the industry total is 3,845,173 against 2,575,402 at the same date a year ago.
