Abstract

This paper formalizes the principle that a tool never supersedes evidence. Analytical systems can extend perception and computation, yet their outputs remain derived artifacts shaped by data quality, assumptions, objectives, interfaces, and error. The framework requires traceability from output to source evidence, visible uncertainty, contestability, and human responsibility. It rejects both automation worship and automation rejection: tools may materially improve inquiry, but they do not acquire epistemic authority merely by producing a score. The paper proposes an evidence hierarchy, override rules, and evaluation criteria for decision-support systems.

1. Source Basis and Scope

5. Require review when high-impact outputs conflict with primary records.
6. Record overrides and their reasons.
7. Measure calibration, false positives, and false negatives.
8. Retire or revise tools that repeatedly distort the record.

5. Testable Propositions

P1

Reviewers can reconstruct an output from the preserved evidence.

P2

Contrary evidence remains visible.

P3

Tool confidence correlates with observed accuracy.

P4

Human override improves outcomes rather than merely protecting preferences.

6. Failure Conditions and Falsification

The framework should be revised, narrowed, or rejected where its categories cannot be applied consistently, where it does not improve prediction or decision quality, where simpler existing methods perform equally well at lower cost, or where its use produces the harms it was designed to prevent.

7. Limitations

- Primary evidence can itself be false or corrupted.
- Complex systems may be difficult to explain fully.
- Human reviewers are also biased.
- Evidence hierarchies vary by domain.

8. Ethical Safeguards

- Do not convert a conceptual framework into a diagnosis, legal conclusion, or coercive authority.
- Preserve contrary evidence and failed applications.
- Separate description from moral judgment.
- Require stronger review as consequences become more irreversible.
- Permit affected persons to contest classification and use.
- Keep the author and the framework open to correction.
